Notes from the composer:

My teacher, Roy Harris, once wrote a piece called *Ode to Consonance*. Angel Falls is more an ode to dissonance. Conductor Bob Shoup once said "Your dissonances have purpose." And music critic Sandor Kalay of the Kansas City Star wrote that "Songer has a melodic gift." Put these two things together and one gets a melodic dissonance with a definite key center.

Some harmonies used in Angel Falls are based on a system developed by the composer in 1961 and that answered the question "What if harmonies were constructed out of unlike intervals?" The initial answer was a system which I called The NOVA system. Later I changed the name to X-Y-Z system and later still expanded the vocabulary to what I called the X-Y-X system. I first scored Angel Falls for four horns but later decided that a fifth part would allow all players to have some time off the lip. A few notes were added but the piece is essentially the same in both versions.

It should be enough to know that the title does not reference a place or geographic feature. We all have angels.
